1. Project Overview

The Belt and Road Shanghai Exchange Project, funded by Teacher Education Centre, UNESCO; Shanghai Normal University; Research Institute for International and Comparative Education from Shanghai Normal University, aims to facilitate the exchange of educational ideas and experiences among education administrators, teacher education researchers and primary and secondary school principals. Starting in 2017, it serves as a platform at Shanghai Normal University (SHNU) to welcome international candidates. Due to international travel restrictions, the Project was conducted through a series of online activities in 2020, 2021, and 2022. In 2023, the Organizer resumes on-site activities and seminars in Shanghai. Interested colleagues are encouraged to send us their registration form as attached for this project.

The theme of this year's project is ***Professional Development for Secondary and Primary Educators***, which specifically covers the following four aspects:

(1) Teaching and Learning International Survey (TALIS);

- (2) Teachers & AI;
- (3) STEM Teachers;
- (4) Teachers' Social-Emotional Development & Support for Students.

This project is co-hosted by educational administrators, primary and secondary school principals, and educational experts from universities and research institutions. Centering on the theme, all participants will conduct discussions on relevant issues through a combination of communication seminars, on-site visits, and observations (see Attachment for details). It is expected that this project will promote the professional development of teachers in the Belt and Road Initiative (BRI) partner countries, advance the reform and development of basic education in these countries, and drive the continuous realization of educational modernization in BRI partner countries.

2. Introduction to the organizer



The UNESCO Teacher Education Centre (TEC) is a dedicated institution within the UNESCO network, established to advance global excellence in teacher development. Following its approval at the 39th UNESCO General Conference in November 2017, the Centre was officially headquartered in Shanghai. In April 2019, the State Council of China formally certified the UNESCO TEC's establishment, and in September 2020, the Chinese government and UNESCO solidified their collaboration through a foundational agreement outlining the Centre's governance framework. Mandated to serve as a “global hub” for teacher education, the UNESCO TEC operates across three core pillars: 1) Service provision, delivering innovative solutions to address global educational challenges; 2) Standard-setting, establishing benchmarks for teacher training and professional development; 3) Research and resource leadership, curating knowledge, managing resources, and fostering international dialogue. Additionally, the Centre undertakes a strategic mandate to strengthen global teacher education systems through knowledge production, capacity-building initiatives, technical support, and the

dissemination of best practices. By bridging policy, research, and practice, the UNESCO TEC aims to empower educators and institutions worldwide to meet evolving educational demands.



Shanghai Normal University (SHNU), founded in 1954, is a comprehensive university with salient features of teacher education and particular strength in liberal arts. SHNU manifests a high-quality academic staff of 2,915 teachers and researchers, including 1,831 full-time teachers, among which there are 300 professors (or equivalents) and 667 associate professors (or equivalents). Located in the metropolis Shanghai, SHNU boasts special features and strength in international cooperation and exchanges. By March 2021, the University has established links with 405 universities and educational institutions in 40 countries and regions. Every year, more than 2,000 foreign students choose to study at SHNU, and a large number of SHNU teachers and students visit and study in universities abroad.



The Research Institute for International and Comparative Education (RIICE) is an important branch of Shanghai Normal University (SHNU) and the founding team of UNESCO TEC. It is also the University Think Tank of Shanghai Municipal Government for Global City Education, the

International Education Research and Consultation Centre Education Policy Research Unit affiliated to MOE, and the MOE Base for International Education Studies. RIICE is also the Shanghai organizer of several international large-scale educational surveys, including Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA) 2009 & 2012, Teaching and Learning International Survey (TALIS) 2013 & 2018, TALIS 2018 Video Study, and Systems Approach for Better Education Results (SABER) 2014.

3. Notice to this project

- This is a non-profit annual project for international professionals in education and

social affairs held by the Teacher Education Centre, UNESCO and the Research Institute for International and Comparative Education, Shanghai Normal University.

- To respect diverse cultural contexts, the Project will accept a maximum of three registered participants from each country. For applicants with similar professional backgrounds, the Organizer will follow a “first come, first served” policy.
- The registration fee and tuition for the Project are waived. The Project organizer will cover local accommodation, breakfast and lunch, and transportation between the hotel and workshop venues during the project. Participants are responsible for their round-trip tickets.

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01 Overview

In November 2017, the 39th General Conference of the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) approved the establishment of "Teacher Education Centre under the auspices of UNESCO" (hereinafter referred to as the "Centre") in Shanghai, China. Following approval from the State Council of the People's Republic of China, an agreement was signed between the Shanghai Municipal Government and UNESCO in September 2020. The Centre commenced its official operations in October 2021, following the inaugural session of its Governing Board.



Under the auspices of UNESCO, the Centre is dedicated to the field of teacher education and development. It operates within a framework that encompasses four pivotal functions: knowledge production, capacity building, technical support, and information sharing. The Centre aspires to emerge as a preeminent global entity in the realm of teacher education, fulfilling the roles of service provider, standard setter, and research and resource management centre. It is instrumental in propelling the objectives of the Education 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

02 Core Functions



Knowledge Production:

The Centre engages in scholarly research pertaining to the advancement of basic education and teacher education, encompassing assessments of administrative management and educational innovation. It is committed to the global dissemination of research outcomes.



Capacity Building:

The Centre executes multi-tiered training programs designed to bolster the competencies of entities engaged in basic and teacher education. It orchestrates training workshops and seminars targeting policymakers, teacher educators, pivotal school administrators, and educators from UNESCO Member States and affiliated institutions.



Technical Support:

Utilizing information and communication technologies in conjunction with expert networks, the Centre extends specialized services in the domains of basic and teacher education to the least developed countries, with a particular focus on regions such as the Asia-Pacific and Africa.



Information Sharing:

The Centre fosters collaborative efforts with UNESCO headquarters, field offices, regional bureaus, National Commissions, Category 1 institutes, and other Category 2 Centers. This collaboration aims to exchange best practices, cutting-edge theories, and methodologies concerning teacher policies, in-service training, and professional development.

03 Governing Board

The Governing Board is comprised of 11 members, including the Chairperson, and is tasked with providing strategic direction and oversight of the Centre's operations. It also approves the Centre's medium- and long-term plans. The Board convenes annually to review the Centre's annual report and approve the work plan for the upcoming year.
